EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S CORNER

A belated best wishes to colleagues and friends for 2008! Having sent a fairly lengthy update in December of 2007 I intend to keep this part of the Newsletter relatively short. Nevertheless, there are still a number of significant items on which to report.

The Council and Executive of AFPC held their midyear meeting, February 2-3 in the Leslie Dan Faculty of Pharmacy building in Toronto. The weather in the East just prior to the meeting was quite severe and unfortunately, our Atlantic colleagues from Halifax were not able to attend.

AFPC Awards

The report from awards committee chair, Mary MacCara of Dalhousie noted that there has been a healthy number of applications for the AstraZeneca New Investigator Award, the Pfizer Research Career Award, the Bristol-Myers Squibb National Education Award, the new Wal-Mart Canada Future Academic Leader Award, and the Merck Frosst Graduate Fellowship Award. This was the first year that electronic

submissions of applications were used and except for the odd hitch the e-application process appears to be working out fairly well.

Further award deadlines include the GlaxoSmithKline Graduate Student Research Award nominations that must be submitted to the Executive Director by March 1, 2008. Students intending to compete in the AFPC-Whit Matthews Graduate Student Poster Award and the AFPC Pharmacy Student Research Poster Award competitions should submit their abstracts to the Executive Director by March 15, 2008. March 15 is also the deadline for nominations for the Rx & D visitation program, Honored Life Membership, and for AFPC President. Conference 2008

Conference chair Lalitha Raman-Wilms of the University of Toronto reported that the AFPC section of the program for the joint AACP/AFPC Conference in Chicago, July 19-22, is nearing completion. Details will soon be posted on the AFPC web site. For those planning to attend the conference, the Chicago Sheraton Hotel and Towers (1-877-242-2588) is now taking reservations for the AACP Conference. **Conference 2009**: The AFPC Conference will occur in Halifax at the Lord Nelson Hotel, June 3-6, 2009. This date is immediately following the CPhA conference in Halifax. **Conference 2010**: AFPC is intent on meeting jointly with CSPS in Vancouver at the end of May or early June 2010.

Communications

Committee chair and President Simon Albon indicated that AFPC needed to engage in a serious revitalization of the web site. The French version is frequently out of date and other components of the site are not as user-friendly as they might be. The directory of pharmacy researchers needs to be updated on a regular basis and to be made more visible to potential users. A major task

this year is to create a directory of teaching expertise in Faculties of Pharmacy in Canada. This task has been facilitated by a generous grant from Rx & D Canada who will be recognized as sponsors of the teaching directory.

PEP Canada

Pharmacy Experiential Programs of Canada (PEP Canada) presented an extensive report of recent activities. Cheryl Cox of the University of Alberta and Kelly Brink of the University of Manitoba are the current co-chairs. PEP Canada has provided CCAPP with feedback on the draft of the new accreditation standards. A Web CT site has been created at the University of Alberta for purposes of information sharing and communication. PEP Canada will be making a presentation on patient safety as part of the AFPC program for the joint AACP/AFPC Conference in Chicago and will be participating with their AACP colleagues in a session on Early Experiential Education Programs. A poster for the Chicago conference is also being planned. Council was very pleased with the progress being made by this special interest group.

Ingrid Price of the University of British Columbia reported on the progress of the Program Evaluation Working Group. Members of the group include Ingrid Anne Marie Whelan (Chair). representative), Linda Hensman (ADPC representative), David Hill (CCAPP), John Hawboldt (MUN), Mary MacCara (Dalhousie), Céline Brunelle (Laval), Claude Mailhot (Montreal), Lalitha Raman-Wilms (Toronto), Nancy Waite (Waterloo), Silvia Alessi-Severini and Colleen Dobson Metge (Manitoba), Rov (Saskatchewan), and Sheila Kelcher (Alberta).

The task of the group is: To develop "An AFPC Guide for Program Evaluation for Canadian Faculties of Pharmacy". A face to face meeting of the group was held November 17 – 18 in Toronto and subgroups were assigned specific areas of the guide to develop. A web site for the group was created in January 2008 to facilitate this task. A further workshop is likely in the Spring with the intent to present the work of this committee at the joint AACP/AFPC Conference in Chicago in July.

Other news

The Association of Deans of Pharmacy of Canada (ADPC) held a teleconference on January 28, 2008 in lieu of a midyear meeting. The main item for discussion

was the draft CCAPP standards. The Deans will meet later this month in Vancouver with CCAPP Executive Director David Hill to provide feedback from their faculties.

Director Linda Hensman of the School of Pharmacy at Memorial University began administrative leave as of January 1, 2008 and Associate Professor Dr. Deborah Kelly is currently the Acting Director: "Kelly, Deborah" dvkelly@mun.ca

Health Canada recently called for nominations of individuals to serve on the Expert Advisory Committee on the Vigilance of Health Products. Dr. Colleen Metge of the University of Manitoba was nominated by AFPC and I am pleased to report that Colleen has been selected to serve on this important advisory committee for a three year term.

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FACULTY SPOTLIGHT: UNIVERSITY OF WATERLOO

The First New Canadian School of Pharmacy in More Than 20 Years

The University of Waterloo (UW) has welcomed its first 92 students to Canada's newest pharmacy program! They have arrived with unbridled enthusiasm, many questions, and a passion for the profession. The School of Pharmacy forms the anchor of UW's new Health Sciences Campus (HSC), located in the heart of the City of Kitchener. This development brings UW's entrepreneurial, outwardly-focused and dynamic culture to the health sector, promoting discovery and innovation, encouraging bold steps and breakthrough innovation.

In the first phases of the Health Sciences Campus, three professional programs are coming together to share learning opportunities and collaborative training that will position graduates to both understand and function effectively in the current health care environment. The HSC will be home to a new regional program of McMaster University's Michael G. DeGroote School of Medicine, and a teaching and service clinic from UW's School of Optometry. This unique collaboration positions UW at the forefront of inter-professional education.

The Facility

For the first semester, the vanguard class is studying on the main UW campus. The intention is to have partial occupancy of the new Pharmacy facility for May, with the building fully completed by the end of 2008. This first building comprises 120,000 sq. ft., and will house lecture halls, the Professional Practice Laboratory, the Pharmaceutics Laboratory, faculty and staff offices, a student lounge, etc. It is wrapped in a glass curtain wall featuring images of medicinal plants, reflecting the School's intention to bring the history and tradition of Pharmacy to a cutting-edge, urban site.

Ground will be broken for the second building on the campus within weeks. This 77,000 sq. ft. space will be key to UW's initiatives in inter-professional education. The ground floor will house a full-service family health clinic, which will provide experiential opportunities for pharmacy, medicine and optometry students. Optometry will also establish a satellite of its teaching clinic here. The upper floors will be home to the regional McMaster medical program, which has already begun instruction at a temporary Kitchener site, with a class of 15 students.



The New Class

The pharmacy students, who began studying on Jan. 7, come from eight different provinces, and include 12 students from Northern Ontario. Women make up about 60 per cent of enrolment and 40 per cent of all students hold at least one degree. UW is committed to identifying and encouraging students with interests in a range of professional career paths, and the program supports breadth and flexibility in learning.

UW's student selection process has multiple stages. Selection criteria focus as much on interpersonal skills, leadership abilities, and creativity as on academic excellence. Applicants are required to complete an online application, submit a Pharmacy Admission Profile, and provide a letter of reference from a Pharmacist. Candidates are screened based on academic and non-academic criteria and a select group is then invited to attend a personal interview. This provides an opportunity for applicants to distinguish themselves and demonstrate their interests and experiences. Once applicants reach the interview stage, their academic history is no longer considered. Final selection is based on performance in the interview combined with a reading comprehension/writing test. The ongoing enrolment target is 120 students.

Undergraduate Curriculum

UW is offering one of only two pharmacy programs in North America that base experiential learning on cooperative education. The other is found at Northeastern University in Boston. The UW students will gain realworld familiarity with the many facets of the pharmacy profession through 16 months of practical experience, extending throughout their four years of study. Co-op is an educational model that promotes continuous learning through integration of classroom and applied workbased experience. In a co-op environment the onus is on the student to direct his/her own learning, and make valuable contributions in the workplace. Graduates of co-op programs are recognized for their ability to adapt, solve real-life problems, and demonstrate strong discipline-specific skills. They understand their career opportunities and the realities of the workplace. The first co-op experience for the vanguard class begins in September 2008, following two terms (eight months) of academic study.

Co-op work terms will cover not only community, primary care and institutional pharmacy practice, but may also include pharmaceutical industry, regulatory, government or professional association experiences. International experiences are encouraged. More than 700 potential employers have already expressed interest in partnering with this innovative generation of pharmacy professionals by hiring students. At least one work term must be completed in an underserved area.

Applicants are required to have an extensive set of prerequisite courses, which comprise at least two years of university study. This creates room for required studies in such areas as business/entrepreneurship, patient safety, compounding and health informatics. It also allows professional practice courses to move into the first year, and enables students to pursue electives in areas of personal interest.

Waterloo curriculum directly incorporates The Community Service Learning (CSL) throughout the professional program. CSL provides a different type of experiential opportunity that engages students in meeting human and community needs, together with structured activities that encourage reflection and growth from the experience. It is designed to contribute to the breadth of the student experience and enhance professionalism, ethics, diversity competency and communication skills. 21 different community agencies, ranging from the K-W Multicultural Society to the Kitchener Public Library to the Alzheimer Society will be working with teams of students during the first semester.

This is just one reflection of the many ways in which Kitchener-Waterloo has embraced the School of Pharmacy. Linkages with the community extend to the LHIN, local pharmacists, and distinctive partnerships such as the Waterloo Regional Children's Museum. The Museum has just introduced a novel exhibit - Discovering Chimpanzees: The Remarkable World of Jane Goodall. One feature of this display is entitled "Not All Pharmacists Are Human". The School of Pharmacy and two practicing pharmacists partnered to create this feature on the ways in which chimpanzees self-medicate through plant selection.

Research News

Dr. Marianna Foldvari has been appointed Associate Director, Research and Graduate Studies. In this position she will provide academic and administrative establish leadership to internationally-recognized graduate program at the School of Pharmacy. The formal development of the graduate program is underway, with the intention of enrolling students in 2009. Graduate studies will encompass research-based degrees at both the Master's and Doctoral levels, as well as residency and fellowship opportunities.

Recent grant announcements:

Dr. Foldvari; Dr. Shawn Wettig, Assistant Professor and collaborators at the University of Saskatchewan (Drs. I. Badea, R. Verrall) were awarded a CIHR Proof of Principle Program, Phase I grant titled "Development of gemini nanoparticles for non-viral gene delivery" for \$150,000 over 2008-2009.

Dr. Jamie Joseph, Assistant Professor, and his collaborator Dr. Patrick MacDonald of the University of Alberta, have been awarded a \$100,000 USD grant by the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation. Their project is entitled "Non-adenoviral Peptide Modulator Expression to Improve Islet Graft Function". The study will examine the use of a new gene transfer technology called Ultrasound Targeted Microbubble Destruction in the improvement of islet graft functioning and increased successful outcomes.

Dr. Joseph has also been awarded \$85,512 for three years from CIHR, for a study entitled "Novel pathways in the metabolic regulation of insulin release from pancreatic beta-cells". The project will apply newly-developed tools to the study of relevant pathways involved in sensing sugar levels in the blood by insulin-secreting beta-cells, and will have important applications for therapy of both major forms of diabetes.

White Coat Ceremony

Jan. 9, 2008, marked a historic occasion as the first class was welcomed to the profession with a White Coat Ceremony. Speakers included representatives from UW, the Ontario Pharmacists' Association, the Ontario College of Pharmacists, and the Region of Waterloo Pharmacists' Association. The students jointly took a UW-crafted pledge of professionalism. Their white coats were presented by practicing pharmacists who had served as team leaders in the applicant interview process.

The program will build on their experiences and successes with two other new programs - Laboratory Values and Anticoagulation. These new programs focus on building patient care skills and confidence and will position pharmacists to succeed in a new era of health care delivery.

Dr. Ed Knaus: approval from CIHR for a proposal entitled, "The design and evaluation of non-ulcerogenic COX-2 and/or 5-LOX antiarthritic agents and nitric oxide donor prodrug derivatives thereof." Ranked 1st of 41 applications; recommended term of 3 yrs, \$172,802/yr. The primary objectives involve the design, biological and computational evaluation of novel classes of anti-arthritic drugs that do not elevate blood pressure or increase the incidence of blood clot formation.

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
