Conference 2010

FACULTY SPOTLIGHT: DALHOUSIE UNIVERSITY

Use of the Objective Structured Clinical Exam (OSCE) as an Assessment Tool for Pharmacy Skills Lab Courses

The Skills Lab Program at the Dalhousie University College of Pharmacy consists of a skills lab course in each of the 4 years of the curriculum. Each course has a coordinator who is responsible for creating and implementing the course content. Coordinators work closely with other faculty members to ensure connectivity between all components of the curriculum (i.e., problem-based learning courses, critical appraisal series and the practice experience program). An OSCE is used as the final exam in the 3rd and 4th year skills lab courses.

History

When a formal OSCE was first implemented in 2001, it was conducted in the 4th year skills lab course. In 2004 the exam was moved to the final academic term of the 3rd year. This change was made to allow for remediation during the 4th year of the curriculum for students experiencing difficulty. In 2006 a re-allocation of resources provided for an additional exam allowing an OSCE to be administered at the end of the 3rd and 4th year Skills Lab courses. Both 3rd and 4th year OSCEs are reviewed annually to ensure case content is reflective of current practice environments.

Objectives of the Exam: In addition to evaluating therapeutic knowledge, the OSCE is designed to assess

Logistics of the Exam: Successful planning of this exam requires the coordination of 90 students, 16 assessors, 12 standardized patients, and 6 support staff. The exam is held at the Learning Resource Centre (LRC), Faculty of Medicine, Dalhousie University. This facility contains four distinct examination areas (tracks), each of which contains six examination rooms. Each room is connected to a common buzzer system ensuring students will start and finish stations at the same time. Cases are provided to the LRC one month prior to the exam for standardized patient recruitment and training. Completed cases include the following: competencies to be tested; standardized and scripted statements; case patient history introductory page for student; standardized assessor evaluation forms; and required references and props.

the students' communication and problem solving skills, time-management capabilities, and ability to practice in a safe and effective manner. Skills and cumulative knowledge are assessed during the exam through the use of cases written by the skills lab faculty. A case bank has been developed to which 2 to 4 new cases are added each year.

Exam Content: The students are provided with an orientation lecture reviewing the general exam format approximately one month prior to the exam. No specific case content is discussed; however, the students are informed of the general competencies being evaluated. Each exam includes six stations: three patient assessment and/or education stations; one physician interaction station; one pharmaceutical calculations station; and one technical prescription checking station. The patient assessment/education stations may include OTC assessment recommendation/referral, assessment and education regarding prescription medication, and ethical situations. Exam stations last for seven minutes with a two minute interval between stations. During this interval students move between stations and read the case introductory page prior to commencing the next station. Written feedback provided by the assessors is available at a later date for student review.

In the week before the exam, significant time and resources are dedicated to assembling exam content. These tasks include printing and organizing assessor folders, assembling props and references, and final training of standardized patients through role-play with the exam coordinator. Exam set-up takes place the evening before the exam.

Approximately 90 students are evaluated in each OSCE. The students are organized into three large groups examined in succession. The groups waiting to be examined are sequestered in separate rooms. For the active exam, each large group is subdivided into four smaller groups corresponding to the four distinct examination tracks. Total exam time including sequestering can last between two to three hours, with the active examination lasting approximately one hour.

Every effort is made to ensure no communication occurs between the groups and this includes collection of electronic devices that could be used for this purpose.

Assessors and standardized patients attend the exam day for six hours and are provided with a nutrition break and light lunch between successive examinations. Practicing pharmacists are recruited as standardized physicians and assessors and are given an orientation to the exam process and the particular case they are assessing on exam day. The assessors and standardized patients have the opportunity to role-play their case prior to the first group of students being examined to ensure comfort with the case portrayal and evaluation form.

Final Thoughts

Students value and appreciate the OSCE experience and describe it as a fair assessment of the skills lab courses. Exam limitations include the inability to test a broad area of therapeutic knowledge and inability to test complex case scenarios due to time constraints. The OSCE provides a means to evaluate the verbal and

nonverbal communication skills of the students whereas the students are traditionally evaluated by written format in other areas of the curriculum.

A New Graduate Program for the Dalhousie College of Pharmacy!

We are pleased to announce that a new graduate program in the College of Pharmacy in the pharmaceutical sciences has been officially approved by the Board of Governors of Dalhousie University. This Master's degree program will accept its first students for a September 2010 start. The goal of this program is to educate students to become high quality research-based scientists who can contribute to drug discovery and development in academia and the pharmaceutical industry.

As some of you may recall, in the past there was a graduate program at the College of Pharmacy. However, this program was suspended as we transitioned to a problem-based learning curriculum. In recent years, with our transition complete and with the recruitment of new faculty members in the area of pharmaceutical sciences, we felt the time was right to begin anew with our program. The process of developing a new program took approximately three years so we are very excited to be at this stage.

Dr. Neil MacKinnon will serve as the graduate coordinator of this new program as part of his role of Associate Director for Research. The five core faculty who will be supervising students and teaching classes in this area are Dr. Remi Agu, Dr. Kerry Goralski, Dr. David Jakeman, Dr. Tannis Jurgens, and Dr. Pollen Yeung. These faculty have, in the past, or currently, supervise graduate students. Other cross-appointed and adjunct faculty will also play a prominent role.



All graduate students admitted into the program are required to carry out novel, original research. In addition, all graduate students are required, as part of their training, to present and participate in graduate student seminars, and to attend invited speaker seminars. The learning outcomes of this program are as follows:

- a) Students will be competent in performing general laboratory techniques as well as techniques specific to their chosen area of research.
- b) Students will be able to develop and execute a research project.
- c) Students will develop scientific writing skills through the writing of a thesis and scientific paper(s) that result from their research.
- d) Students will develop oral presentation skills through their participation in the seminar series and thesis committee meetings.
- e) Students will develop the ability and confidence to clearly and succinctly communicate the results of their research to the scientific community.
- f) Students will develop clinical thinking skills required of a researcher.

Students can complete the program in full-time or parttime status. If enrolled as a full-time student, it is anticipated that most students should be able to complete the program in two years. The program will be structured using a combination of courses and thesis-based research, with a supervisor and supervisory committee overseeing progress. There is also an optional internship with the pharmaceutical industry. Also, of interest to potential candidates, there is financial support available for students who have a strong academic background.

Drug Information Resources: A Guide for Pharmacists (DIR)

Drug Information Resources: A Guide for Pharmacists (DIR) is a portal providing a launching point for locating resources for over 60 categories of drug, health and professional information. It was created at the College of Pharmacy, Dalhousie University and is located on our website with the direct link (http://dir.pharmacy.dal.ca/). We use it as a means of introducing pharmacy students to reputable and useful information resources for a wide variety of topics. It is also recognized as a useful resource for pharmacists and is linked from the websites of several professional pharmacy organizations in Canada and the United States. You really have to browse the categories to determine what's there for you, but some of our most frequently used categories include Compounding, Drug Identification, Drug Interactions, Canadian Content and Renal Disease/Drug Dosing. Other categories particularly helpful for pharmacy students or faculty members include: Natural Health Products, Pharmaceutical Policy, Drug Use Evaluation, Pharmacokinetics, Patient Counselling, Cardiology, and Pharmacy Stats and Facts. A recently added

category, Tools for Pharmacists, contains links to tools (e.g., calculators, reference tables, guides and score predictors) for use in critical appraisal or when treating patients with osteoporosis, renal or cardiovascular diseases, etc. Links provided within DIR are not limited to websites, but also include links to texts, journal articles and dynamic searches (pre-formulated PubMed searches). Besides those selected by the authors, sources are included after being recommended by faculty members, pharmacists and other health professionals.


DIR was developed and has been maintained over the past thirteen years by two College of Pharmacy faculty members, Elizabeth Foy, Professional Information Officer and Mary MacCara, Pharm D, Associate Professor. Fourth year pharmacy student, Ryan Savary, also currently works on this project as have eleven other pharmacy students over the years. We are grateful for the funding awarded annually by the Dalhousie Pharmacy Endowment Fund.

During the fall of 2009 DIR averaged 7000 hits per month. The majority of users are from Canada and the United States, but we have users from over 100 countries around the world. DIR has been chosen by the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy (AACP) as its single entry for "Bibliographies and Literature Guides – Websites" within its *Basic Resources for Pharmaceutical Education*. The 3rd edition of the text, *Drug Information: A Guide to Current Resources*, considered by library experts to be the ultimate listing of drug information resources, describes DIR as a "five-star guide to Internet sites".²

Please become acquainted with DIR. We think you and your students will find it useful. Should you have any resource or format suggestions, please be sure to let us know.

FACULTY NEWS

UNIVERSITY OF SASKATCHEWAN

Faculty News

The University and College are continuing to address ways to achieve budget adjustment efficiencies that will not compromise the quality of our programs. We are also in the process of determining tuition levels for 2010-11, taking into consideration comparability with tuition at peer programs in Canada, quality, access and affordability. We worked hard in the fall to prepare for the second wave of the H1N1 flu. Although there were significant impacts to individuals and families, the incidence rate in the overall population and to the University was less than anticipated. However, we will continue to be vigilant.

Individual Faculty and Staff News

A special College event was held in the fall to honour retiring faculty Drs. John Hubbard and Gord McKay. In November, colleagues from the University and the profession joined faculty and staff to honour Dr. Dennis Gorecki for the excellent leadership he brought to the College as Dean, and to thank both he and Lynn Gorecki for their generous hospitality over so many years.

In January, with funding support from the University and the College, we recruited a new faculty member in

social and administrative pharmacy, and welcomed Dr. Jason Perepelkin to this position. Jason recently completed a Ph.D. at the U of S, under the supervision of Dr. Roy Dobson.

Ashala Jacobson is our new College Development Officer, and she will focus on major gift fundraising. Heather Dawson has joined the College as Advancement Officer, a new position made possible through a University Advancement grant to enhance our institution's profile through communication strategies; support alumni relations activities; develop and support student fundraising activities; and coordinate special events.

Recruitment will begin soon for an endowed *Chair in Rational Drug Design* to lead efforts to establish our University as a centre of excellence in drug development. The College has also received approval to proceed with recruitment of a *Canada Research Chair in Natural Health Products*, and we will be pursuing this, in consultation with the College of Arts and Science and the College of Agriculture and Bioresources.

Grants and Research

Drs. Anas El-Aneed, Ildiko Badea and Jane Alcorn have received funding from the Canada Foundation for Innovation Leaders Opportunity Fund to "Evaluate the Safety and Biological Fate of New Pharmaceuticals, Specifically Nanoparticles Used in Gene Therapy, as Well as Medications Used by Pregnant Women and Nursing Mothers." The project is also funded by the Government of Saskatchewan Innovation and Science Fund, the University and our College.

Drs. Adil Nazarali and Carol Henry have received a grant through the President's SSHRC Research Fund to study "Barriers to HIV Testing in AIDS-Orphaned Children in Rural Uganda."

Dr. Phyllis Paterson has received funding as part of a team grant from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research and the Heart and Stroke Foundation of Canada to investigate synchrotron imaging techniques to study stroke.

Dr. Gord Zello is working with colleagues on a number of studies: pre- and probiotics in the prevention and treatment of diarrhea; parenteral nutrition contaminated with aluminium and markers of cholestasis; and diet approaches to increase lentil consumption in youth. The projects are funded by the Government of Canada, Janeway Research Foundation and the Saskatchewan Pulse Growers, respectively. Dr. Wendy Dahl, University of Florida, and Adjunct Professor of Nutrition with our College, is working with Dr. Zello and colleague Dr. B. Langkamp-Henken on a project, funded by the Saskatchewan Pulse Growers, to investigate pulse fibre fermentation and nitrogen excretion in patients with chronic renal failure.

Dr. Hassan Vatanparast has been awarded a grant through the President's SSHRC Research Fund to study the impact of socio-economic factors on household food security of immigrant families. Hassan has also received funding through the Prairie Metropolis Centre to investigate nutrition and health issues among newcomer children in Saskatchewan.

The *Pharmacy Class of 2013* was officially welcomed to the College and the profession at the annual *White Coat Ceremony* held in November. Vice-Provost Dr. Ernie Barber brought greetings from the University and Dr. Dennis Gorecki delivered the *Welcoming Address*. The event was generously sponsored again this year by the Pharmacists' Association of Saskatchewan, Wyeth Consumer Healthcare and the Bank of Nova Scotia. We appreciated the participation of student and professional leaders, who presented white coats to our new students.

We are pleased to report that our Pharmacy students are proud recipients of two national awards, presented at the recent CAPSI PDW conference in Toronto. They received the 2009 Award of Professionalism, an annual recognition to the school which holds the best organized and most well received Pharmacy Awareness Week in their city. This award is extremely competitive

amongst Canadian schools. Our students will utilize the money from this award to fund this year's PAW in March 2010. Pharmacy students also took home the 2009 International Pharmaceutical Students' Federation Health Campaign Award for hosting the most organized and well received AIDS Awareness Week across Canada.

The College was well represented at *PDW 2010*, with sixty-two of our students taking part. The U of S will host *PDW 2011*, and student organizers are working hard to plan this exciting event.

Pharmacy and Nutrition students recently met with Dean David Hill to learn more about his role and vision as Dean, and to address any questions or issues they have. The *Blueprint for Pharmacy* and the upcoming program redesign were key topics for the Pharmacy students.

Graduate News

Dr. Susan Whiting is this year's recipient of the University's *Distinguished Graduate Supervisor Award*. Susan received the award at *Fall 2009 Convocation*. The impetus for her nomination came from former and current graduate students. In their letter of nomination, former Dean Dennis Gorecki and Associate Dean Fred Rémillard wrote "Susan has significantly contributed to the success of her students, through her conscientious, innovative and generous mentorship, and her example of excellence in scholarship and striving for the highest standards."

Erica Ling has begun Postdoctoral studies with Dr. Gord Zello to determine the cause of neurological dysfunction in metabolic acidosis. Erica will receive her PhD (Pharmaceutical Sciences; Supervisor Dr. Jane Alcorn) at *Spring 2010 Convocation*. She was one of this year's four *Saskatchewan Health Research*

Dr. Chantal Guillemette was awarded the 2009 North American ISSX (*International Society for the Study of Xenobiotics*) New Investigator Award in honor of James R. Gillette at the 16th North American ISSX Meeting-Baltimore, Maryland– October 18-22, 2009.

A study conducted by Dr. Renee Bazin Héma-Québec and Dr. Frédéric Calon from our faculty has received financial support of more than 230 000 \$ from the Talents program of Talecris Biotherapeutics Inc. The goal of both researchers and their PhD student Isabelle St-Amour is to determine the mechanisms of action of intravenous immunoglobulin (IVIg) in an animal model of Alzheimer's disease. Indeed, using IVIg to treat a prevalent disease such as Alzheimer will inevitably lead to a shortage of IVIg. It is therefore imperative to use an animal model to better understand the therapeutic effects of IVIg and find alternatives to help the 450 000 Canadians suffering from Alzheimer's disease.

Among the naturally occurring variants for the UDP-glucuronosyltransferase (UGT)1A3 enzyme, Mr. Trottier and his collaborators established 3 phenotypes with low, intermediate and high activity for the conjugation of norursodeoxycholic acid, a novel anti-cholestatic molecule. These observations are just in time for helping the interpretation of a phase I clinical trial, which will be started in spring 2010. Jocelyn Trottier is holder of a PhD fellowship from CIHR.

Dean Emeritus Wayne Hindmarsh was recognized by the Canadian Foundation for Pharmacy as the 2009 recipient of the Pillar of Pharmacy Award. This award is presented annually at a gala dinner to an individual who has demonstrated a life-long commitment to the pharmacy profession. The program featured a number of speakers representing all of the groups Dr. Hindmarsh had touched over the course of his career. In his acceptance speech, Dr. Hindmarsh remarked how this award is a reminder not only of his commitment to the profession, but also a reminder of the need "to continue to raise the bar for those who have chosen pharmacy as a career for the ultimate well being of those whom we serve - the public." He ended his remarks by thanking those in the room and all those who had helped him along the way but could not attend that evening "for your support of my vision, the future of our profession and most importantly your friendship. I share this award with all of those who have supported me along the journey."

Dr. Hindmarsh was also recognized by *Pharmacy Practice* with their Commitment to Care and Service Awards Lifetime Achievement Award. In the profile included in the November issue of *Pharmacy Practice*,

Dr. Hindmarsh's efforts to advance the role of the pharmacist were noted. "For too long," noted Dr. Hindmarsh, "pharmacists have been ... in the background and not seen as leaders. I have been preaching this philosophy for years, and I believe that governments are beginning to realize that we can do more and are offering us opportunities that we must accept."

Dean Henry Mann received the 2009 Paul F. Parker Award from the University of Kentucky at the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists Midyear Clinical Meeting and Exhibition, held in Las Vegas December, 2009. The Paul F. Parker Award is given annually to an individual of high personal and professional ideals who has made significant contributions to pharmacy practice. This individual will have demonstrated throughout his/her career the personal commitment, leadership and enthusiasm to the profession which Dr. Parker sought to develop in his residents. Dean Mann was selected to receive this award for his many contributions to pharmacy practice and scholarly pursuits.

New Grants

Professor Ping Lee, GlaxoSmithKline Chair in Pharmaceutics and Drug Delivery, recently signed an agreement with MaRS Innovation and the University of Toronto to commercialize a novel sustained release formulation of nitric oxide (NO) for applications in wound healing, including diabetic ulcers. This disruptive technology facilitates the therapeutic release of NO over a two-week period, dramatically improving its effectiveness in wound healing applications. This wound healing technology is an important discovery and one that stands to benefit 45 million diabetics worldwide.

In the drive to improve the early detection and treatment of cancer, Associate Professor Christine Allen from the Faculty, in partnership with Dr. David Jaffray of Radiation Oncology and Medical Biophysics at the University of Toronto, have developed a unique technology that combines contrast agents with targeted, long-lasting nano-particles for use in multiple medical imaging platforms. This technology combines more

than one contrast agent into a nano-particle for use in multiple types of imaging, resulting in lower doses of contrast agents (with lower toxicity) and enabling targeted delivery to, and retention by, specific tumors. The use of nano-particle technology allows the contrast agent to be routed differently in the body, making it circulate longer and target disease processes for detection and characterization. Recognizing the broad application and flexibility of this technology, MaRS Innovation and the University Health Network have entered into an agreement to jointly commercialize this promising technology.

Professor David Hampson has entered into an agreement with Lundbeck Research USA, Inc. to conduct a preliminary study on the effects of metabotropic glutamate receptor allosteric modulators in fragile X syndrome knockout mice.

Dr. Hampson is also leading a group of 14 researchers including Co-Investigators Associate Professor Christine Allen, Professor Reina Bendayan, Professor Jean Gariépy, Professor K. Sandy Pang, and Professor Raymond Reilly who recently received a training grant from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research for the study and development of macromolecule-based drugs as a source for new drug entities. The objective of this strategic training program is to bring together leaders in the fields of biological drug development to train young scientists in the design, development, and delivery of biologically-based medicines.

Professor Reina Bendayan has received approval of operating (3 years) and equipment grants from the Ontario HIV Treatment Network, Ministry of Health of Ontario, for the project entitled "Role of Drug Transporters in Permeability and Efficacy of Microbicides at Human Genital Barrier Sites". This project aims at investigating the role that membrane-associated drug transporters play in the disposition of microbicides at genital and rectal mucosa barriers and will guide novel therapeutic strategies that could optimize genital drug bioavailability and reduce the potential for failure of microbicide therapy for the prevention of HIV.

Introducing Multiple Mini Interviews

Beginning with the 2010 admissions cycle, the Leslie Dan Faculty of Pharmacy will include a personal interview process in its selection criteria for admission to the Undergraduate Pharmacy program. The admissions interviews will assess personal qualities such as oral communication, problem solving, and ethical reasoning skills that were deemed to be among key attributes for a pharmacist. Following a detailed study of the literature related to admissions interviews in health professional schools, and the success of a pilot interview session in September 2009, the Faculty has approved the implementation the Multiple Mini Interview (MMI) as part of the admissions process in 2010. The MMI is similar in format to the objective structured clinical examination (OSCE). Applicants rotate through a circuit of 8-10 'stations', each designed as a brief (6-10 minute) interview with a trained interviewer who assesses one or more non-cognitive characteristics. The MMI was developed at McMaster University's Michael G. DeGroote School of Medicine and U of T is a licensed user of their ProFITHR model. For further information, contact Andrea Cameron.

Dr. Rebecca Law has received a cross-appointment to the Faculty of Medicine at Memorial University, in the Discipline of Family Medicine, commencing September 1, 2009.

Dr. Debbie Kelly will be starting a sabbatical in May 2010. She is hoping to focus her research on conducting a review of our admissions process, but also assessing patient perspectives on the role of the community pharmacist.

General Faculty News

As indicated in the previous AFPC Newsletter, the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador has provided funding to expand the School of Pharmacy to 60 students per year. As a result we have engaged a consulting company to assist in identifying the space needs a student body of 240 (up from 160) would

require. The faculty/staff and student representatives have had extensive input with the consultant group. Once this work is complete we will present our plans to Government and advocate for a new building to house the expanded program. In the meantime we are investigating the availability of leased space off campus to house the growing program.

The School will be recruiting two tenure track positions in Pharmacy Practice and one tenure track position in the Pharmaceutical Sciences within the coming months. In terms of administrative positions the School is in the process of hiring a Communications Coordinator.

The MUN Relay for Life 2010, which raised over \$70,000 in the fight against cancer, had 7 teams from the School of Pharmacy. Sarah Alteen (Chair, MUN Relay for Life 2010) said our School's support "contributed greatly to the success of this year's Relay."

Grants

The University of Waterloo is expected to play a large role in \$30 million worth of research into treatments for juvenile diabetes that was announced in November, 2009. The project is a two-year partnership between the Federal Economic Development Agency for Southern Ontario, and the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation Canada. The funding will support the launch of a Clinical Trial Network in southern Ontario, expand diabetes research, and help bring new technologies to the marketplace, including support for initiatives such as the Foundation's Artificial Pancreas Project and Regenerative Medicine Technology Program. McMaster University is also part of the project, as well as other southern Ontario institutions. Both the School of Computer Science and the School of Pharmacy will play a significant role in collecting and assessing the associated clinical data.

Certina Ho, Adjunct Assistant Professor, and collaborators at the Institute for Safe Medication Practice (ISMP), were awarded the Canadian Society of Hospital Pharmacists Ontario Branch Pharmaceutical Care Grant for 2009. They received funding of \$1,725
