PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

On behalf of the AFPC Council, I would like to extend warm greetings to everyone for the start of a new academic year! No doubt that everyone is already quite busy with teaching responsibilities, grant deadlines and other activities!

The work ahead for AFPC continues to benefit from the leadership of past presidents and members. Over the last year, I have enjoyed working under the leadership of Dr. Mike Namaka, who has brought his experience, insights and vision to this organization. In June, there was a change to the office of the Executive Director; we have appreciated all the contributions of Dr. Frank Abbott over his many years of service to this organization. The AFPC executive and council has now started to work closely with its new Executive Director, Dr. Harold Lopatka. I feel truly privileged to be a part of this council who are a dedicated group of individuals from across the country!

AFPC council members were busy over the summer, with our council meeting held in conjunction with the AFPC conference in Richmond, BC. For the first time this conference was hosted under its new name – the Canadian Pharmacy Education and Research Conference (CPERC). This change in the title has been important, as it more closely reflects AFPC's mission and commitment - to support and promote: innovation, excellence and leadership in both pharmacy education and research. It also reflects a more broad range of pharmacy educators contributing to our conference programs.

The Conference was very successful with an engaging program under the theme of "Bringing the Blueprint to Life". It provided an excellent forum for discussion and debate amongst our members, guests and students. On behalf of AFPC, we extend a heartfelt thank you to Simon Albon (chair), Ingrid Price and the other members of the organizing committee from the Faculty of Pharmaceutical Sciences at the University of British Columbia for all of their tremendous work and effort!

The annual awards ceremony, held at the end of the conference on a shipboard cruise in beautiful Vancouver, was a wonderful venue to celebrate excellence in education and research amongst our members and students. For the first time this year, the AFPC Woods-Hughes Special Service Awards were presented to three of our members. This award recognizes AFPC members who have provided exceptional service to the association over the years.

AFPC Council will be busy this year as we start to work on many things. On June 3, 2010, Council approved the new Educational Outcomes for entry-to-practice programs in Canada. Over the next several months, we plan on finalizing the "Levels of Performance Expected of Graduates" document to support the outcomes. This will facilitate Faculties in aligning their programs with the new outcomes and to determine additional changes and modifications required by curricula. These educational outcomes, which set a new standard for Canadian programs, have been disseminated to groups outside of AFPC. Over this next year, we will work to seek input and comments from Faculties and other groups, as part of an interim review.

One of the ongoing challenges facing all Faculties is the need for recruitment and retention of preceptors, as well as an increase in quality experiential training sites. Also, with the increasing societal need for safer medications, more cost-effective drugs, and individualized medication therapy, there is a clear recognition by those outside of pharmacy of the crucial role that pharmacists can play in ensuring better health

outcomes for patients. All of these require us to closely examine how best to enhance our curricula and to determine new models of experiential training. AFPC will continue to work with ADPC, PEP-C and other groups in working towards this initiative.

The Program Evaluation Task Force, under the Chair of Ingrid Price, completed its work last year in developing guidelines and collating tools for use by Faculties. Over this next year, AFPC will determine strategies to ensure that these tools are easily accessible to Faculties and identify ways of supporting Faculties in implementing Program Evaluation.

During the CPERC, AFPC members had the opportunity to hear, discuss and debate on many areas relevant to the Blueprint. The Blueprint for Pharmacy² emphasizes the need to focus on strengthening and realigning our profession's social responsibility and scope of practice with the evolving healthcare needs of Canadians. The

Blueprint implementation plan will influence much of AFPC's activities over the next few years as we move towards a common vision for our profession.

I look forward to my term over this next year, working with our Executive Director and our Council. AFPC also looks to you, as its members, to continue to provide feedback to council - our best resource is the strength and depth of our membership! Please contribute your thoughts and ideas and these and other issues, and share these with your respective council members or myself.

AFPC Activities

The summer was a busy time for AFPC with the Canadian Pharmacy Education and Research conference (CPERC), and the annual council and general meetings.

CPERC 2010 – "Bringing the Blueprint to Life" – The conference was held jointly with CSPS. It was a tremendous success with nearly 140 individuals (including guests) attending the AFPC program and a positive budget variance achieved. The conference program, facilities and host city were enjoyed by participants. A conference of this quality would not be possible without the efforts of the organizing committee, program participants and sponsors. Special thanks to Simon Albon and the conference planning committee (Frank Abbott, Ingrid Price, Robert Sindelar, David Fielding, Marion Pearson, Wayne Riggs, Stelvio Bandiera, Adam Frankel, Lynda Eccott, Tessa Nicholl, Colleen Brady, Tamiz Khanji, Suzana Topic) for all their work in making the conference so successful. Thank you to the session chairs, speakers, facilitators, and poster presenters for the enlightening program. Finally, thanks to the 13 corporate sponsors. AFPC Annual Council Meetings and Annual General Meeting - The AFPC council meetings were held before and after the conference. The annual general meeting was held on June 3. For the 2010-2011 year; Lalitha Raman-Wilms assumed the role of President, Ingrid Price was nominated as President Elect and Mike Namaka Past President. Tessa Nicholl, Nése Yuksel, Silvia Alessi-Severini and Nancy Waite assumed new 3 year terms as councilors. Daniel Thirion returned to council from a 1 year absence. Bev Allen, Andrea Cameron, Mary MacCara, Frédéric Colon, and John Hawboldt continued in their terms of office. Roy Dobson and Sylvie Marleau completed their terms as councilors. Anson Tang (U of Waterloo) is replacing Nancy Waite while she is Interim Director.

Reports from committees were reviewed and new directions and appointments approved. Other items reviewed and approved include: the appointment of Harold Lopatka as new Executive Director, the 2010 AFPC operating budget, the new Educational Outcomes for first degree programs in Pharmacy in Canada, and the location of the 2012 conference in Quebec.

Blueprint for Pharmacy - A major driver for AFPC and ADPC activities over the next few years will be related to the Blueprint for Pharmacy implementation plan. To achieve the vision for pharmacy, the Blueprint for Pharmacy implementation plan identifies 50 key strategic actions and 130 deliverables in five key action Educational and continuing professional development is identified as one of five key action areas. There are 13 specific strategic actions and 47 deliverables identified for completion of this key action area. AFPC and / or ADPC have been identified as a potential lead or partner organization for 12 of the action items and for 36 of the deliverables. AFPC, ADPC and individual members will be required to lead and make significant contributions during the implementation of this key action area of the Blueprint. David Hill and Henry Mann represent ADPC, and Zubin Austin and Lalitha Raman-Wilms represent AFPC on the Blueprint Steering Committee and on

discussion groups. The committees are prioritizing and facilitating the development of proposals to obtain external funding for projects.

Educational Outcomes for First Degree Programs in Pharmacy in Canada - The new educational outcomes will be subject to an interim AFPC review after 1 year and a final AFPC review after 3 years. The outcomes were disseminated to AFPC council, ADPC members (and further disseminated within faculties), as well as to national pharmacy organizations and selected national external stakeholders (medicine, nursing). The 2011 AFPC operational and funding priority is to complete the levels of performance for the new educational outcomes. The new educational outcomes are posted on the AFPC website (see http://afpc.info/downloads/1/AFPC Education Outcomes AGM June 2010.pdf).

ADPC Activities

There are 3 new members of ADPC. Helen Burt is Acting Dean (U of British Columbia) replacing Bob Sindelar who is on a leave until January 1, 2011. Dr. Lavern Vercaigne (U of Manitoba) is Acting Dean until a new Dean is recruited. David Collins moved to the position of Vice Provost (Academic Planning / Programs) at the University of Manitoba. Nancy Waite is Interim Hallman and Health Sciences Campus Director until a new Director is recruited. Jake Thiessen retired June 30, 2010.

ADPC held an interim meeting in June 2010. Pierre Moreau (University of Montreal) was nominated as ADPC President and Harold Lopatka appointed ADPC

Executive Director. The ADPC mid year meeting is being held October 3-4, 2010 in Banff.

This is an exiting time for AFPC and ADPC. The community pharmacy practice environment is changing very rapidly. Post secondary institutions are undergoing significant cost restraints. AFPC / ADPC are effective platforms for leadership and implementation of national educational strategies and initiatives. We are very close to a tipping point where AFPC / ADPC will be required to provide major leadership and expertise in the roll out of the Blueprint education deliverables. I am looking forward to working as your Executive Director during this period.

AFPC wishes to recognize the contributions from pharmacy organizations that choose to help make a difference in academic pharmacy in Canada.

FACULTY SPOTLIGHT: UNIVERSITY OF MANITOBA

New Faculty



Shawn Bugden joined the Faculty effective September 1, 2010 as an Associate Professor. Shawn graduated from the University of Manitoba, Faculty of Pharmacy in 1991. He has a special interest in rural pharmacy practice and has been the Regional Director of Pharmacy for the Central Regional Health Authority since 1999. His interest in critical literature appraisal and optimal drug utilization led to his involvement in the Prescription Information Services of Manitoba (PrISM) program. As a founding member of the Canadian Academic Detailing Collaboration (CADC), Bugden has played a role in training, research and resource development for academic detailing nationally and internationally. He has supported these efforts through his involvement in the international research collaboration, Knowledge Translation - Improved Clinical Effectiveness through Behavioural Research Group (KT-ICEBERG).

Bugden completed his M.Sc. in Evidence-Based Medicine from Oxford in 2006, following which, he developed an interest in pharmacoeconomics and outcomes research. This led to his involvement with the Provincial Oncology Drug Program of CancerCare Manitoba as a pharmacoeconomics pharmacist. Bugden is also a frequent presenter at provincial and national conferences. He has published more than 15 research and educational papers and is currently completing his Pharm.D. degree at the University of Washington. In addition, he has been involved in the undergraduate education of pharmacy and medical students since 2005 and has played a leadership role in the pharmacy profession as a Past-President of the Manitoba Association of Pharmacy Directors and as

the current President of the Manitoba Pharmaceutical Association.



Dr. Emmanuel Ho joined the Faculty effective July 1, 2010 as an Assistant Professor. Dr. Ho earned his Ph.D. in Pharmaceutical Sciences from the University of Toronto and was awarded a doctoral graduate scholarship from the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC).

As a post-doctoral fellow at the British Columbia Cancer Research Centre, Dr. Ho was awarded the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) Post-Doctoral Fellowship along with the Michael Smith Foundation for Health Research Post-Doctoral Fellowship (MSFHR).

Prior to joining the University of Manitoba, Dr. Ho was a Research Assistant Professor at the University of Utah in the Department of Bioengineering. His research interests include the development and prevention of HIV/AIDS and other infectious diseases. Upon joining the University of Utah in 2009, he was awarded two highly competitive research grants as the principal investigator. One of these grants was awarded by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation to develop a novel intravaginal delivery system for the sustained induction of mucosal immunity in the prevention of HIV transmission.



Dr. Harris Iacovides joined the Faculty effective July 1, 2010 as a full-time clinical instructor. Dr. Iacovides completed the majority of his academic training at the University of Manitoba obtaining a B.Sc. in Microbiology in 1999, B.Sc.(Pharm.) in 2003 and M.Sc.(Pharm.) in 2006. Dr. Iacovides obtained his

Pharm.D. at the University of Toronto in 2010 and now joins our faculty as an instructor for the undergraduate clinical courses.

Faculty and Research News



Dr. Mike Namaka, Associate Professor, attended the Controversies in Neurology conference in Prague, Czechoslovakia from October 8 through 12, 2009. At the conference, Dr. Namaka expanded the neuroscience analytical skills of the Faculty of Pharmacy to include

that of an assay called "Chromatin Immunoprecipitation Assay" also referred to as CHIP.

Currently, the Faculty of Pharmacy's research team has a research interest in neurological disorders affecting central nervous system (CNS) myelin such as multiple sclerosis. The team is specifically interested in exploring the role of MECP-2 in myelin formation. As such they are examining various proteins such as brain derived neurotrophic factor (BDNF) and others that MECP-2 may regulate during the formation and maintenance of CNS myelin. The CHIP technique explored at the conference allows them to explore the impact that MECP-2 has on the various proteins involved in myelin formation, repair and maintenance.

The CHIP analytical technique has now been implemented within the Faculty's neuroscience research laboratory. Doctoral candidate, Mr. Parvez Vora is currently using this technique to assist him during his training within Dr. Namaka's laboratory.

Research Profile: Hope Anderson



Dr. Hope Anderson is a Nutraceutical Researcher in the Faculty of Pharmacy. Her program studies the mechanistic link between type 2 diabetes and cardiovascular disease, utilizing nutraceuticals, functional foods and natural health products as investigative tools as well as potential therapies.

Over the past year, Dr. Anderson has experienced great success in her research program. She has received significant grants for her studies, earning a Canadian Institutes of Health Research-Manitoba Health Research Council (CIHR-MHRC) grant for \$201,998 over two years for her research project entitled "Protective signaling by PPARs in cardiac hypertrophy." Additionally, Dr. Anderson was awarded

a grant in the amount of \$100,000 over two years from the Heart and Stroke Foundation of Manitoba for her grant entitled "Regulation of cardiac hypertrophy by the CB2 cannabinoid receptor."

"Finding effective ways to avert pathological cardiac hypertrophy, or abnormal growth of the heart, has emerged as a research priority," says Dr. Anderson. "It is well-documented that drugs that activate Peroxisome Proliferator-Activated Receptors (PPARs) block hypertrophy, and with this support from the CIHR and MHRC, my laboratory will investigate the signaling mechanisms involved. By learning how PPARs control the transition from hypertrophy to heart failure, we hope to discover novel molecular targets that might be manipulated for therapeutic gain to treat heart disease."

Dr. Anderson also achieved personal success at the 2009 Canadian Cardiovascular Congress in Edmonton, AB, where she received the 2009 New Investigator Award from the Canadian Hypertension Society. The award recognized excellence in the field of hypertension research by a new investigator. Findings from Dr. Anderson's laboratory were reported at the Congress, including presentations entitled "Blood pressure-independent correction of resistance artery structure but not intrinsic wall stiffness by resveratrol in the spontaneously hypertensive rat" and "Suppression of cardiac myocyte hypertrophy by PPAR-DGK signaling".

Grants

Dr. Hope Anderson received a grant in the amount of \$30,000 from the California Table Grape Commission for her grant proposal Effects of Grape Consumption on Resistance Artery Structure, Function, and Stiffness in Hypertension.

Dr. Xiaochen Gu received a grant in the amount of \$93,900 starting September 1, 2010 (over two years) from Nanjing Aosaikang Medical Group Corp. Ltd. (ASK Corporation). Dr. Gu's research project is entitled "Solid lipid nanoparticles of fluconazole and lidocaine".

Dr. Mike Namaka received a grant from the University Research Grants Program (UGRP) in the amount of

\$7,460.00 for a one year period. Research project is entitled "Expression levels of immune mediators in rat model of MS".

Dr. Mike Namaka received a grant from the Manitoba Institute of Child Health in the amount of \$4,993.00 for a one year term beginning July 1, 2010. Research project is entitled "Transcription regulation of BDNF in pediatric pain syndromes".

Ms Michelle Nelson (Graduate Student of **Dr. Ruby Grymonpre**) received a grant in the amount of \$20,000 from the University of Western Ontario for the TUTOR-PHC Fellowship.

Student News: Volunteerism

The University of Manitoba's pharmacy students participated in several community service endeavours this year with a range of organizations, including the Canadian Diabetes Association, H1N1 and seasonal influenza vaccination clinics and the Winnipeg Interprofessional Student-Run Health Clinic (WISH Clinic) as part of their service learning requirement.



Diagnosed with type 1 diabetes in 2008, first-year student Christopher Dupont developed an interest in becoming a diabetes advocate, which led him to fulfill his learning service requirement with the Canadian Diabetes Association (CDA). He has become an asset to the organization, delivering Learning Series presentations to children and adults.

Since his diagnosis, Christopher's empathy for people with diabetes has grown every day. "When I interact with individuals with diabetes, it is reassuring to me as well – because we are in this together." Christopher's volunteer experience has been rewarding, particularly when he has impacted young people's lives. "We recently visited a school where a little girl was diagnosed with type 1 diabetes. When she found out I'm also living with type 1 diabetes, she kept repeating, 'you have it too, I just can't believe it.' She was so happy to know she was not alone."

Volunteering as a diabetes advocate has motivated Christopher to be his best. "As a volunteer with the CDA, I am given the opportunity to learn more about a disease that is currently affecting three million Canadians, and do something about it."

Christine Leong and several of her fellow fourth year students also saw an issue that they wanted to do something about. During the busy flu season, they volunteered at the Louis Riel School Division seasonal flu clinic to help prepare vaccine for administration and provide other support as needed. "As a pharmacy student, it was exciting to be involved in one of the participating centres that provided free seasonal influenza vaccinations to high-risk patients," said Leong. "I, along with two other pharmacy students and a pharmacy technician student, participated in drawing up the seasonal influenza vaccine into syringes. Between the four of us, we prepared about 120 prefilled syringes in four hours." The experience provided a valuable look at the vaccination process. Leong and her fellow students were able to observe the nurses and nursing students who provided the vaccination and assisted in pre-screening the patients. This illustrated the importance of pharmacists in the vaccination process. "I felt pharmacy students have the potential to play a significant role in the screening process. Overall, I was amazed by the level of organization that took

place at the clinic. The coordinators were absolutely friendly, optimistic and energetic. It was definitely rewarding to be a part of a service in which people were particularly concerned about the influenza virus. Moreover, it was terrific to see pharmacy students taking part in such an important issue."

The WISH Clinic is another endeavour that sees pharmacy students tackling important issues. An interdisciplinary holistic health centre, the WISH Clinic serves a community that faces many health challenges, with higher rates of diabetes, heart and respiratory diseases, among other conditions. Two third year pharmacy students, Mark Allan and Ashley Walus, were instrumental to the operation of the WISH Clinic, acting as Executive Co-Chairs along with a student from the Faculty of Social Work. "Becoming involved with this clinic has truly been a rewarding experience," said Allan. "We all have gained so much from spending time in the community and getting to know the people of Point Douglas." The WISH Clinic, located at Mount Carmel Clinic on Main Street, is an

interdisciplinary initiative that includes students and licensed professional mentors from a broad range of disciplines. The interdisciplinary nature of the WISH Clinic enables comprehensive health care services to patients and provides collaborative learning opportunities to students from different educational programs. It further enhances education by providing

students with an opportunity to become more aware of inner city issues, social needs, and the medical concerns of this community. The efforts of these students have brought pride to their Faculty and benefited patients throughout Manitoba. We salute their outstanding service to the community.

My experience at the Handicapped Orphans Protection Center (Electives Program)

When I learned about the fourth year open elective program during my first year in pharmacy, I knew that it would be an opportunity to do something meaningful and exciting. I promised myself then that I would use this opportunity to volunteer abroad and help people less fortunate than I. I decided to volunteer in Vietnam because, being half Vietnamese, I have a strong personal connection to the culture, the land and its people. This was an opportunity to give back to a place and culture that has helped to shape who I am. I also knew it was a place where I could make a meaningful difference because there are so many people in need of help. I chose to volunteer with Volunteers for Peace Vietnam in their disabled children orphanage program, and was placed at the Handicapped Orphans Protection Centre of Thi Nghe in Ho Chi Minh City under the pharmacist there to help care for the children.

Thi Nghe is a government-run centre for orphaned children with mental or physical disabilities. The Centre aims to provide care for these children and educate them to the fullest extent of their physical and mental capabilities. Today, approximately 230 staff members serve over four hundred children ranging from infants to young adults with about 150 suffering from cerebral palsy. It also has a fully equipped physiotherapy area, a medical treatment room, medical

laboratory, 12 classrooms, an indoor swimming pool and an outdoor playground. Unfortunately, despite all its progress and accomplishments, the orphanage is still not adequately staffed or funded to provide the care and facilities the children need, and consequently relies heavily on volunteers and donations.

My first day at Thi Nghe was an overwhelming experience, it is hard to prepare to see so many physically and mentally disabled children in one place, most abandoned by their families and many confined to their beds or wheelchairs all day. I had never been to an orphanage or worked with disabled children before so it was very intimidating. The children were separated into rooms of 20 to 30 children based on age and type and severity of disabilities.

During my time there, I worked in three rooms. One had children five to 10 years of age who were mentally and often physically disabled. It was an interesting and, at times, scary room to work in because many of the children are active, unpredictable and require a lot of care and attention. A few of them were also violent towards themselves and, rarely, towards others, usually because they were hungry and impatient for their turn to be fed, but sometimes for no apparent reason at all. The second room I worked in had older children five to 18-years-old and all were severely physically disabled, many suffering from cerebral palsy and confined to their beds all day. Most showed some mental disability as well. Only three children in this room went to school, the rest were confined to their beds all day. I mainly helped to feed this room each morning because it was especially understaffed. The third room I worked in housed very young children from two to six years of age, most suffering from cerebral palsy or other physical handicaps. Many of the children understood Vietnamese and were very playful. I helped to feed lunch, gave the children exercise and practice walking and stimulated those who couldn't move as much as possible. I spent about 60 per cent of my day feeding children and giving them their medications, 20 per cent playing with the children, and about 20 per cent with the pharmacist preparing medications to put into the food.

Professionally, my experience was close to what I expected. I rightly presumed that in Vietnam there would be more challenges in providing adequate, quality health-care to patients and that I would face many challenges of my own in both working with the health care professionals and with the children. Although I speak some Vietnamese, there was a language barrier between the staff and I, which limited my learning. However, I found that this improved with time and I was able to learn a lot just by watching. Although I did not get to discuss with the pharmacist her beliefs about mental disorders or the goals of treatment at this orphanage, I got the feeling that keeping the children alive and as comfortable as possible was the main objective. I think this is a result of the attitude that it is not realistic to hope for much more, along with a lack of resources. Although the way they do things at the orphanage may not be up to Western standards, I believe whole-heartedly that they do the best job they can with what they have. One thing that surprised me was that almost all of the medications they used were traditional Western medicine; they just did not have nearly the range of choices that I am used to seeing due to lack of funding and availability. In addition, I found their limitations and challenges to be similar to those we face in Canada – such as funding, staffing shortages, staff management, regulation and safety – but on a larger scale.

The two most important things that I learned after working in Vietnam, which will stay with me as I start my career are that: spending time with patients to understand the challenges they and their loved ones face is an important component of being a health care professional, and; medication is an important aspect of health care, but it is just one aspect of health care, and as a future pharmacist, I need to advocate for and learn about all aspects of health care, not just the drugs that are used.

Although I did not get to do as much clinically as I would have liked, personally, my experience was more rewarding than I ever expected. I learned so much about myself from working with the children and staff as well as the many incredible volunteers from all over the world. I feel that the knowledge I acquired during the last four years in pharmacy helped me to just be more understanding of the challenges that are faced with providing the best quality health care to people and to identify problems in terms of medication safety. I feel I was able to make a small impact on a few children's lives in a short time, which is something that has changed me in a positive way and which I know has made me a better person and future pharmacist.

A group of first-, second- and third-year pharmacy students, led by instructor **Kristine Petrasko** (BSc Pharm)/00), have joined together as Team Pharmacy to help the fight against Multiple Sclerosis (MS). In the past two years, they have achieved an amazing fundraising total of over \$33,000.

They raised over \$15,000 for the cause in the lead-up to the April 26, 2009 MS Walk. Dr Knaus joined the faculty in 1972 initially as an Assistant Professor, then promoted to Associate Professor in 1976 and to full Professor in 1980. Dr Knaus's research focused on rational drug design encompassing the design, synthesis and biological evaluation of novel next-generation types of heterocyclic molecules to treat arthritic, cardiovascular, gastrointestinal, viral and cancer diseases, obesity, or as potential radiopharmaceuticals for use in imaging tumors including gene therapy applications, and to diagnose (image) the onset of Alzheimer's disease. He supervised 29 graduate students (25 PhD, 4 Msc), 61 postdoctoral fellows, 8 research associates, and 9 sabbatical fellows. Ground Broken for New UBC Faculty of Pharmaceutical Sciences Building

Construction is currently under way for the future home of the Faculty of Pharmaceutical Sciences, slated to open in fall 2012. The \$133.3-million building is made possible by a \$86.4-million investment by the Province of British Columbia – the second-largest infrastructure investment to UBC in a single building, after the adjacent Life Sciences Centre.

During the ceremony, Prof. Robert Sindelar, dean of the Faculty of Pharmaceutical Sciences, honoured **Profs. John McNeill, Frank Abbott, Bernie Riedel** and **Finlay Morrison**, who served as deans and acting dean between 1951 and 2002, with the presentation of ceremonial shovels.

Built to Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) gold certification standards, the six-storey, 22,871-sq.-metre building will accommodate the expansion of the faculty's undergraduate and graduate programs and help address the shortage of pharmacists in B.C. The undergraduate "entry-to-practice" program will expand by 47 per cent, or 72 student spaces each

year, starting September 2011, bringing the total number of undergraduate students to 896 by 2015.

The Faculty's master's, PhD and Doctor of Pharmacy (Pharm.D.) programs will also grow significantly with the completion of the new facilities. The post-baccalaureate Pharm.D. program at UBC was the first in Canada. The two-year professional degree provides advanced education in clinical pharmacy practice in hospitals, ambulatory care or community-based sites.

The building will also be home to the Centre for Drug Research and Development (CDRD), which provides drug-development expertise and facilities to enable investigators from research universities and associated institutions to bridge the commercialization gap between academic discoveries in the life sciences and the development of new medicines.

Since its launch in 2007, CDRD's unique academicindustry model has attracted over \$75 million in funding from government and industry partners. It has also been recognized by the Government of Canada as a Centre of Excellence in Commercialization in Research.

Recent Research Awards

Dr. Urs Hafeli, with Dr. Mary Ensom and Dr. Boris Stoeber (Mechanical & Electrical Engineering) as co-PI's, received a 3-year CHRP grant titled "Microneedlebased painless drug monitoring system in interstitial fluid". Their aim is to develop a point-of-care system for the analysis of some of these drugs that is not based on blood sampling, but on extracting and analyzing interstitial fluid (ISF). They will develop a test method based on the ability of an array of microneedles to painlessly extract minute amounts of interstitial fluid from a patient's skin. A first drug candidate is methotrexate, an effective but also highly toxic drug used in cancer chemotherapy, rheumatoid arthritis, acute organ rejection, and other conditions. The methotrexate content of the interstitial fluid in the disposable microneedle chip will be determined using a specific

enzymatic assay in a rapid and portable point-of-care instrument.



Recruitment is underway for a *Chair in Rational Drug Design*, generously supported by GlaxoSmithKline Inc., Saskatchewan Health, SaskTel, the University and College.

The University has approved our College's proposal for a *Health Quality Improvement Initiative for the Health Sciences*. To spearhead this initiative, funding has been secured from the Provost's Committee on Integrated Planning, provincial Ministry of Health, Saskatchewan Health Quality Council and Health

Science colleges to recruit a *Chair in Quality Improvement Science and Interprofessional Health Education*. Work is ongoing to establish additional research chairs.

Dean David Hill and faculty are embarking on a number of major initiatives, the first of which is a program evaluation of the BSP, based on the AFPC/ADPC Pharmacy programs logic model, educational outcomes and levels of performance expected of graduates. This is in advance of our upcoming CCAPP accreditation review (Fall 2011). We are linking this closely to a quality assurance plan for our Pharmacy and Nutrition undergraduate and Guided by the Blueprint for graduate programs. *Pharmacy*, we are also in the process of developing a position paper on the re-design of the Pharmacy program.
